One Final Reminder...Medicaid Tamper Resistant Prescription Law Becomes Effective on April 1

As we have previously communicated, the Medicaid Tamper Resistant Prescription requirements will be effective beginning April 1, 2008.

The law applies only to written prescriptions for covered outpatient drugs; prescriptions that are transmitted from the prescriber to the pharmacy verbally, by fax, or through an e-prescription are not impacted by the statute, and so those methods may be used as alternatives to a written prescription. The law applies whenever Medicaid pays any portion of the cost of a prescription.

To be considered tamper resistant on April 1, 2008, a prescription pad must contain <u>at least one</u> of the following three characteristics:

- 1. one or more industry-recognized features designed to prevent unauthorized copying of a completed or blank prescription form;
- 2. one or more industry-recognized features designed to prevent the erasure or modification of information written on the prescription pad by the prescriber;
- 3. one or more industry recognized features designed to prevent the use of counterfeit prescription forms.

By October 1, 2008, a prescription pad must contain <u>all three</u> of the above characteristics to be considered tamper-resistant.

What can pharmacists do if they are not sure if a prescription meets the requirements?

- <u>Call the prescribing practitioner</u> to obtain verbal confirmation of the prescription and document the confirmation appropriately. (NOTE: the pharmacy does not need to speak to the prescriber directly; a nurse or administrative staff person who is authorized to act on behalf of the prescriber may confirm the prescription.)
- <u>Fill the prescription and obtain documentation within 72 hours</u>. A pharmacy may fill prescriptions on an emergency basis, provided that the pharmacy obtains a compliant prescription within 72 hours after the fill date. The compliant prescription may be in the form of a written prescription on tamper-resistant paper or may be obtained by verbal communication with the prescriber, by facsimile, or by e-prescription.
